Jassy Braich, BC, Senior Consultant, Sales & Service

"I love the CIBC Run for the Cure because it brings people together and unites us to fight the battle against breast cancer," says Jassy, who has been with CIBC for 13 years and has organized fundraising events in Vancouver a number of times.

Linda Schulze, Prairies & Northern Ontario, Asset Specialist

"Working at CIBC and being involved in the community was important to me," says Linda, who is returning as Regional Run Champion this year, after serving previously as Run Champion for five years.

Linda, whose partner's mother is a Breast Cancer Survivor, says she is inspired by the feedback that she receives from survivors telling her that they are here today because of the Run and CIBC and the Canadian Breast Cancer Foundation. "My best Run memory is from my first Run day as Run Champion in Winnipeg. The sea of Pink t-shirts of survivors and Team CIBC was more than words can explain.
